Light refreshments at 6 pm. Meeting called to order at 7 pm. Thank you to our hosts at The Barnes Foundation and thank you Peg Smigna.

Quorom Report. Number of association members this evening: 55.

Welcome to our special guests: Officer Jesse O Shea, Officer Steve Kiefer, Captain Colleen Billups, Ms. Candace Player from the Hub of Hope, and Councilperson Helen Gym.

**Presentations:** City Council President Darrell Clarke. Councilman Clarke shared some of his own personal history. He said that the city nearly "went under" during covid, but was able to tap into a significant reserve. Tourist dollars and tax dollars were greatly suppressed during the pandemic. The next budget will need to replenish the reserve. This budget season is quite challenging, with sky high property assessments averaging a 32% increase city wide (both commercial and residential). City council is debating

homestead, loop, and senior tax support. We will have a new superintendent of schools in the next few days, and schools need to be on sound fiscal footing. The city budget must be balanced. Crime in the city is the number one problem. 100 cameras will be placed around 19 schools directly feeding into the crime center in Philadelphia as an attempt to prevent crime. A new museum, the Calder Cathedral, will be coming to the Parkway. 1801 Vine – an announcement will be coming in about 2 weeks. They will be selecting developers for an upcoming project at the old Family court. We need greater support of the neighborhood schools. We have a new library director, a new director of the PMA. Councilman Clarke took questions from President Boylan and the audience. The 2100 block of Cherry directional change happened without neighborhood input - Councilman Clarke had promised a neighborhood hearing last year to revisit this decision in a more transparent way. He agreed that we should have one this year. 15th Street bike lanes: Councilman Clarke has not supported these in the past. He would like to see traffic studies done not during covid to get a more realistic assessment of traffic flow and use. OTIS needs to consider bicycles, pedestrians, parking, and other concerns. CSX trains and maintenance issues continue to cause blockage of the Race street crossing. Councilman Clarke has little control or influence over CSX's actions. Motorcycles, ATVs, and dirt bikes continue to be a dangerous nuisance. Red light cameras will be installed along the parkway to catch the racers. We may be able to next install speed cameras. The police have been diligent in trying to address this serious issue. How will security be addressed at the next two large parkway events in light of the serious shooting incidents? There will be a large police presence at the Welcome America and Made in America events as well as other events. The PA supreme court needs to examine the gun laws in the state. The city struggles with a lack of support at the state level. Could the Cherry street area flooding be addressed? One member complained about potholes and the lack of communication among departments in the city such as the Streets Department, 311, and Septa. We appreciate Councilman Clarke's attention to our neighborhood concerns and thank him for his presence this evening.

PUBLIC SAFETY TIPS - Lock all doors and Windows when not at home. Make it hard for intruders to break in to your home. Police have flyer to distribute on June 14<sup>th</sup>.

GRAFITTI - CLIP will assist. https://www.phila.gov/services/streets-sidewalks-alleys/report-graffiti/or call 311. Report graffiti, If you see graffiti in your community, you can request its removal for free. The Graffiti Abatement Team can usually remove or cover up graffiti in 4-5 days, except in cases of adverse weather

PARKING ON CALLOWHILL/FRANKLINTOWN BLVD for # 6 Parking stickers — Eilene, Dennis and Fifth District Council Office, along with PPA with walk the neighborhood to address the parking space shortage in JUNE, hopefully before the Annual Meeting.

#### **ZONING REPORT**

1. 1776 Benjamin Franklin Parkway- An application has been made for signage at 'The Terrace on 18<sup>th</sup>'. The variances needed refer to the size of three flat wall signs and their location above the second floor windowsill. The formal RCO meeting will be at our January 2022 Board meeting.

The Applicant presented plans and photos of the signs that have already been erected without complete approvals.

A Motion was made to OPPOSE the request for a variance after the fact, as it violates both the spirit and letter of the law and the non-compliant signs should be removed by the Applicant and replaced. The Board voted unanimously 30-0. The ZBA hearing is scheduled for March 16<sup>th</sup>, 2022 at 2:00PM.

The Applicant has requested that the Board reconsiders the vote taken at the January Board meeting and has been granted a continuance of their ZBA hearing. A discussion will be held on the Tuesday April 12<sup>th</sup> Board Meeting.

After discussion at the April  $12^{th}$  Board meeting, the Board agreed to continue to oppose the request for a variance. This information was provided to the Applicant's attorney along with a request to schedule the ZBA hearing. The date is TBD.

2. 500 N 18<sup>th</sup> Street- An application has been made for signage for 'Thrive Affordable Vet Care' in a commercial space at the corner of 18<sup>th</sup> and Spring Garden. Spring Garden Civic Association is the Coordinating RCO for this variance and held a public meeting on Monday June 13<sup>th</sup> SGCA had been the Coordinating RCO last year when the Applicant had sought and received a Use variance for the space previously occupied by 'Golden Chopsticks', to be used for 'Animal Services With No Overnight Stays'. Th ZBA hearing is scheduled for August 24<sup>th</sup>, 2022 at 2PM.
